FOCUS ON... The Environment

This month our main focus is our environment group, recently renamed as ECiC - Eco Christians in Cumbria (the Environment group of Churches Together in Cumbria).

This group comprises members who have had lifelong involvement in environmental issues through work, and others who have individual and collective interest in it. They come together to encourage, support and inform churches, individuals and other groups how to live in a more environmentally friendly way. As individuals we can all improve our day to day habits. New shops are opening in a number of locations where you bring your own containers to buy unpackaged foodstuffs, thus reducing our need for plastic. Many people are now building "eco bricks" where you pack your non recyclable plastic into a clear plastic bottle, which is then used as a building material. see www.ecobricks.org

Caring for our common home

Forget all the current political shenanigans and heated debates. The most challenging, urgent and intractable issue facing us today does not make many front pages or political manifestos. It is the gigantic, and growing, elephant in the corner of the room. It is of course, our rapidly changing climate and its consequences, not just for us, but for everyone and everything for whom planet earth is home. That climate change is the result of human activity, specifically our addiction to burning fossil fuels. Recent conclusions from the world's leading climate scientists are that we have little more than ten years left to effect major and radical changes to humanity's polluting activities.

How should we and our churches respond? That is the theme of a major conference which will take place on February 2nd 2019 at Keswick school (advert on page 1). It is aimed at all people across Cumbria, and we are inviting local sixth formers to bring the passions and insights of a younger generation to the day. Leading theologians Keith Ward and Peter Scott will deliver the keynote addresses, and they will be supported by a programme of workshops and a "market place" where you can glean information and ideas. Social Responsibility Monthly Update

A new year, a new energy and a new car! The new car has come into its own already - taking me to many different areas of our county to progress the social justice work for CTiC. I was recently invited to participate in the Bishop's Council Ecumenical conversation on ecumenical developments within Cumbria. I see this as an important part of my job, not just to keep social issues high on others' agendas, but to offer those issues and projects as support and enhancement to forthcoming changes, especially across borders.

Our housing group for example, evolved from our discussion day last year and has evolved into a wonderful proactive and influential group in the housing and homelessness world. I now sit on two housing strategy forums, and our very presence at meetings has enabled two different housing groups and councils to work together where they once did not.

Our discussion day this year is set for Saturday 29th June and our topic is isolation and loneliness. We are in discussion with ACT (Action with Communities in Cumbria <u>www.cumbriaaction.org.uk</u>),Linking Lives (<u>www.linkinglives.uk</u>) and CVS (Cumbria Council for Voluntary service <u>www.cumbriacvs.org.uk</u>) about the contribution they will make to our discussion day. We expect this topic to attract a lot of attention, and are confident positive joined up working will emerge from this day. Loneliness affects not just the elderly, but a recent BBC survey showed the age group 16-24 as most affected. We further recognise young mothers, organisation leaders, home based workers, and single and childless people are but a few of the other groups who can experience loneliness.

Sandra Radcliffe is settled in her new role as Modern Slavery worker for the county, and we continue to work closely with her. Just before Christmas Cumbria University joined our group and aims to raise awareness of slavery with students, not only that they will be vigilant for signs of it, but that they will learn to protect themselves from being trafficked. We hope to get the Clewer Initiative materials into schools this term.

This new year also sees us meeting with the Fresh Expressions movement in order to work more closely with them on social issues so we can be mutually supportive and share our learning. (www.freshexpressions.org.uk/places/cumbria)

Cumbria Churches Dementia Conference (17/11/18)

The third annual Cumbria Churches' Dementia Conference was held at the Carver Uniting Church in Windermere on Saturday November 17th and attracted 79 participants from across the county and further afield.

The Conference was chaired by **David Richardson**, Dementia Ambassador for CTiC. He began by asking that the 'Dementia Enablers' present should identify themselves. Almost 30 people rose to their feet, being just some of the 118 Enablers who have volunteered to help make their own church (or circuit or group) aware of, and responsive to, the needs of people affected by dementia.



The next speaker was the **Revd Richard Teal**, Chair of the Cumbria Methodist District. His topic was 'Dementia in Rural Areas'. He reminded us of the scale of the problem:

Over 9 million people live in rural areas of England. The percentage of the population over the age of 65 is set to rise by over 40% in the next seventeen years (and that figure will be disproportionately higher in rural areas, given the tendency of younger people to move to urban areas for employment)

Particular problems that people with dementia in rural areas encountered included:

Difficulty accessing services at different stages of dementia

Lack of accessible public transport and the withdrawal of one's driving licence Loneliness and social isolation

Worry as to what would happen in an emergency

To these should be added the issues that carers may have to face

Transport pressures including being expected or called on to drive

Their own needs as a carer not being acknowledged or assessed separately

Richard encouraged participants to think of ways in which they might be able to help address these needs and praised the CTiC project for the change that it was making.

He introduced our third speaker, **Yvonne Myers**, Chaplain at the MHA home in Workington. Her presentation was on 'Biblical Yoga'. As she explained: 'There is a need to help people with dementia to hear the readings in a way that is helpful for them by delivering it in a way where they can be connected to the scripture in that moment.' Participants relished the chance Yvonne gave them to interact with the nativity story.

Each Conference has included a stand-out contribution from someone who is living personally with dementia. Our speaker this year was **Hilary Doxford**, an Alzheimer's Society Ambassador and a member of the World Dementia Council. Hilary called her talk 'Dementia: a journey of discovery and hope'. She offered three watchwords for her dementia journey to date: fear, despair and hope. She paid tribute to husband Peter and their 'support dog', Tilly.

She spoke of the not-so-good - battles, frustrations, misunderstandings, wearing down, avoidance, loneliness and isolation – and of the best: anything that triggers that inner, overwhelming sense of joy, nature, great choral works, retreats, words, animals, being in the mountains or at sea.

She summarised what churches might do: Include; involve; enable; support Share the good news Create moments of joy Dementia conference report continued...



The afternoon session began with a presentation by **Colin Capper**, Head of Research Development & Evaluation for Alzheimer's Society. He told us of the scale of the issue worldwide, with the number of people with dementia set to rise from 46.5 million to 131.5 million over the next 35 years. If global dementia care were a country, it would be the eighteenth largest economy in the world.

He drew attention to the need to give greater priority to dementia research. The cost to society of dementia is twice that of cancer, yet the amount of money devoted to research into the latter is seven times greater than that for

dementia. There have been no new treatments for dementia since 2003. He listed three drugs which may assist in regard to Alzheimer's disease and which are in the latter stages of their trials and spoke also of the possibility of 're-purposing' (five drugs which are in use for another condition and which are being tested to see if they might be effective against dementia).

Colin stressed the steps that could be taken to reduce one's likelihood of developing dementia:

Be physically active; eat healthily; don't smoke; drink less alcohol; exercise your mind; take control of your health.

In the second session ('Go tell it on the mountain'), four people associated with the project gave practical examples of the ways in which it was making a difference in Cumbria. We heard about:

The guardian angel devices being introduced in the Kendal area at the instance of a Dementia Enabler (following a pattern established in Wigan) which enable people with dementia to live with greater confidence in the local community

'Messy Vintage': a programme which links primary schools and care home and is being run by a church in Kendal.

The leading role that two Enablers are playing in the establishment of the Northern Fells Dementia Action Alliance -helping to make that deeply rural part of the county dementia-friendly.

The fellowship meetings being developed in Penrith for Enablers in the Eden district

We also looked outside the county and heard about the 'Lyrics & Lunch' programme run by a church in Lancaster, providing opportunity for singing and worship (and lunch) for people affected by dementia.

The Conference concluded with a short service of dementia-friendly worship, devised by the Revd Lucie Lunn, Chair of CTiC's dementia reference group, and led by the Revd Richard Teal.

Cumbrian clergyman and foster carer urges others to think about fostering



A Cumbrian-based rector, Rev Rob Jackson, is calling for more people to think about fostering across the county and says "God has been at the heart" of his own decision to foster babies.

Right now across Cumbria there is an urgent need for more foster carers to provide supportive, safe and happy homes for children.

Cumbria County Council already supports over 200 foster families, but with nearly 700 children needing foster families, they are always looking for more

people to join in.

If you have a spare room at home and a lifestyle that has room for a child, then why not become part of Cumbria's biggest family?

Reverend Rob Jackson, who is the rector of St Nicholas' Church in Whitehaven, and his wife Tracey, have been fostering with Cumbria County Council, for more than five years.



They are short term foster carers for children under two and also offer parent and child placements (a specialist type of fostering

where a young parent, usually a mother, and baby, comes to stay with you at a time when they need extra support).

Rob said: "I am a former youth worker and I've always loved working with children. So, as our two boys grew older and we still felt young in ourselves, we realised we wanted to give something back. That's how the fostering came about.

"It works well for us in that we've been able to work from home and get our network of support at the church involved and God has been at the heart of all of this. Becoming foster carers wasn't about us, it was about the children. It was seeing there was a real need and we could do something to help.

"If children are born into particularly difficult situations we want to be able to provide them with a new life and new hope."

The county council is looking for people who can foster children of all ages, particularly siblings who need to stay together, and teenagers.

A package of support is available 24/7 to help foster carers in their role, including local support groups, their own social worker, generous allowances and flexible training.

THE UPPER ROOM -HAWKSHEAD HILL BAPTIST CHAPEL Lake District

What makes us happy?

An invitation to lead Livability's The Happiness Course

What makes us happy? It's a question that has been debated by philosophers and scientists for centuries.

Deep happiness can come through exploring what's really important in life, through building strong, healthy relationships and through searching for deeper meaning and purpose. To discover true happiness is to grapple with life's most important questions.

Churches have a key role in supporting people in exploring these questions, and already make a significant contribution to tackling isolation and building community wellbeing. Exploring happiness together helps build new connections and offers the chance to make choices that lead to real change. **The Happiness Course** is a four week course developed by Livability, the disability charity that connects people with their communities. It explores attitudes to happiness, drawing from positive psychology and personal development – and offers discussion, exercises and space to reflect. Leaders report a picture of individuals impacted by new friendships, renewed relationships and participants taking new directions in life.

Here's what our current leaders have to say about the Happiness Course:

"It is great to have a course on wellbeing that has Christian themes but is not explicit. The course gives people an opportunity to think, and practical tools they can use. It is very much relevant to the needs that people have today."

"A great way to bring people together and a way for us to engage with more people."

"One of group that did the course reported in real shift how they think about their values —and their faith — and how they shared those with their children."

Spiritual Direction Training Course

In 2019 Cumbria Ecumenical Spirituality Group will be offering a course for those who would like to become Spiritual Directors.

The course will be held at Hawkshead Hill Baptist Chapel on one Saturday per month over ten months. The dates we've agreed so far are: 27 April; 1 June; 22 June; 13 July; 28 September; 19 October; 23 November 2019. Dates for January, February and March 2020 will be confirmed later. The course will cost £200 per person and will include drinks throughout the day. Participants are asked to bring a packed lunch. Ideally participants will commit to attending all sessions to make the most of the teaching offered and allow the formation of trusting relationships within the group. Morning sessions will be taught with practical sessions after lunch, including sharing of real issues in small groups.

Anyone who has completed the Nourishing the Soul course is eligible to apply. There are 18 places available (limited due to space and availability of course leaders). Anyone who has not done Nourishing the Soul but has an equivalent course or experience is also welcome to apply. Places will be allocated at the discretion of the CESG team.
