Social Responsibility Update

I have had some time off during March, so I have not had so much contact, but great work continues. The Domestic Abuse group met to discuss rolling out more training across the county, and progress continues in developing informal relationships between groups to raise awareness of Modern Slavery. Links are strengthening with health and education, and we hope to have a presence at Integrated Care Community groups and meet with GP surgeries now doing Social Prescribing.

The next few months will be supporting development of the environment group (Eco Christians in Cumbria). We wish to use modern technology and social media to enhance the work of this group and engage with a wider audience. If anybody is interested in environmental issues, please do get in touch.

We will also be continuing with preparations for our discussion day in June on Isolation and Loneliness. This is already attracting a lot of attention, and we are working closely with ACTion with Communities in Cumbria, and .Cumbria CVS who will have input to the day.

FOCUS ON... FOSTERING

During May's Foster Care Fortnight, which runs from Monday 13 to Sunday 26 May, Cumbria County Council is asking churches across the county to sign up to its Fostering Friendly Churches (FFC) scheme.

Foster carers have an important role and the FFC scheme asks local churches to help provide them with a network of support that allows them to change the lives of the children in their care.



Launched in September, the scheme is part of the council's ongoing drive to recruit more foster carers for vulnerable children across the county; with churches which sign up also being asked to participate in foster carer recruitment campaigns throughout the year.

Cumbria County Council already support over 200 foster families, but with close to 700 children in care, they are always looking for more people to join in.

Reverend Rob Jackson is the rector of St Nicholas' Church in Whitehaven, one of the first to sign up to become fostering friendly in Cumbria. Rob who, along with wife Tracey, has been fostering with Cumbria County Council for more than five years, said: "As foster carers ourselves we are very happy that St Nicholas' Church has become the first church in the west of Cumbria to support this initiative.





"I am a former youth worker and I've always loved working with children. So, as our two boys grew older and we still felt young in ourselves, we realised we wanted to give something back. That's how the fostering came about.

"It works well for us in that we've been able to work from home and get our network of support at the church involved. If children are born into particularly difficult situations we want to be able to provide them with new life and new hope. God has been at the heart of all of this and now by signing up to the scheme we hope that we do even more to support children and young people in our community."

The Churches Trust for Cumbria has received a National Lottery Heritage Fund grant of £75,400 for an exciting heritage project, Caring for Cumbria's Churches. Made possible by money raised by National Lottery players, the project focuses on improving the sustainability and resilience of church buildings across Cumbria. The project will provide those who care for our church buildings with training and skills to better manage these

unique buildings. It also aims to realise the potential of church buildings as community assets and raise their profile as places of valuable heritage interest.

Supported through the National Lottery Heritage Lottery Fund (NLHF), the 18 month, ecumenical project will enable those who care for church buildings to improve their maintenance, and develop a long-term strategy for their sustainability and resilience. A series of videos will explore their potential as places of worship, heritage and community assets and help us to better understand these unique 'living' buildings, in order that they remain for future generations.

Typically the oldest building within a parish, Cumbria's churches are some of the most architecturally, culturally and historically significant buildings in the county. They contribute a key part of the traditional iconography of our towns, villages and rural landscapes. These 'living' buildings, are embedded within our spiritual, historical and social culture. Not only are they part of our heritage, but they tell the story of Cumbria's communities. Quotes

Commenting on the award, Adam Naylor, Chairman of the Churches Trust for Cumbria said: "We are thrilled to have received this support thanks to National Lottery players and are confident the project will raise the profile of these valuable spiritual, community and heritage assets".

The series of videos will be produced by specialist TV production company Brilliant Trees Media who have strong links with the region. Brilliant Trees Media was established 12 years ago in Cumbria by John Harkins and Susanna Boccaccio. The company has produced TV programmes for ITV and the BBC including part of the BBC's Hidden Paintings series which was filmed on location in Cumbria and part of the BBC's History of the World Series which won a Royal Television Society award. Creative director Susanna Boccaccio commented, "This is a very special project we are delighted to be a part of, and we are looking forward to filming in and around our churches across Cumbria this summer"

Notes to editors

The Churches Trust for Cumbria (CTfC) exists to support church buildings across Cumbria. A constant feature in our landscape, we recognise that they are valued for a variety of reasons, not only as places of worship but as buildings of architectural, cultural and historical significance. We aim to support churches and their communities to encourage the sustainable use of church buildings to help keep these unique buildings alive. **Brief History**

The Churches Trust for Cumbria (CTfC) was formed in 2008 as a charitable trust to help secure a sustainable future for Cumbria's churches. In 2010 it became clear that many church communities were struggling to fund their ministry and their buildings. In order to assess Cumbria's churches an ecumenical buildings survey was conducted over 2012 and 2013. Despite the trust going into a period of hibernation in 2013, the Church Buildings Survey Report was published in 2015. The survey revealed that a significant number of buildings are in need of help. In July 2016 the trust came out of hibernation to provide external support for the care, conservation and development of church buildings across Cumbria.



Professor Mullett, who was educated at Cambridge, held the Chair of Early Modern Religious History at the University of Lancaster. He is highly regarded as an expert on Martin Luther, the Quakers, and other aspects of Reformation theology. Currently he is at work on the effect of religious change on the life of people in Penrith and its surrounding area in the 16th century. Michael plans a trilogy, of which one volume has been published. In fact, in terms of both articles and books, he has an impressive record of scholarly publications, all of which are accessible to the lay reader. His long experience as a stimulating lecturer means that he will certainly be worth listening to. Professor Mullett, who has always been committed to the cause of legitimate ecumenism, and who has considerable respect for both the Anglican and Nonconformist traditions, is anxious that representatives from all the churches in Penrith and its district should attend his presentation. Caring for Cumbria's Churches

As you know The Churches Trust for Cumbria has received a National Lottery Heritage Fund for an exciting heritage project, *Caring for Cumbria's Churches*. The aim is to produce a series of "tools".

 The first of these is a self-inspection template to help maintain your church, basically a check list of things to look for inside and outside your building. I have a draft and I am looking for churches to pilot it, to make sure it is useful!

2. Is to produce a series of videos covering a variety of subjects, building fabric; governance; heritage professionals; maintenance and management, but also on open and welcoming church buildings and encouraging visitors. Specialist TV production company Brilliant Trees Media, who have strong links with the region will be filming across the county. If your church is involved in a project please get in touch.

3. The final "tool" is one you may recognise, The Sustainability Rosette. This concept emerged from the ecumenical Church Buildings Survey conducted some years ago. We have made a few tweaks but believe it remains a valuable resource to assess your church's viability. A series of workshops, in May and September, will re-introduce the Sustainability Rosette and host a range speakers discussing funding; heating/ lighting and energy efficiency; security; faith tourism and other ways to help care for your church building. The workshops will run from approximately 9.30 - 3.30pm they are FREE and will include lunch!



Spiritual Direction Training Course

In 2019 Cumbria Ecumenical Spirituality Group will be offering a course for those who would like to become Spiritual Directors.

The course will be held at Hawkshead Hill Baptist Chapel on one Saturday per month over ten months. The dates we've agreed so far are: 27 April; 1 June; 22 June; 13 July; 28 September; 19 October; 23 November 2019. Dates for January, February and March 2020 will be confirmed later.

The course will cost £200 per person and will include drinks throughout the day. Participants are asked to bring a packed lunch. Ideally participants will commit to attending all sessions to make the most of the teaching offered and allow the formation of trusting relationships within the group. Morning sessions will be taught with practical sessions after lunch, including sharing of real issues in small groups.

Anyone who has completed the Nourishing the Soul course is eligible to apply. There are 18 places available (limited due to space and availability of course leaders). Anyone who has not done Nourishing the Soul but has an equivalent course or experience is also welcome to apply. Places will be allocated at the discretion of the CESG team.
